Activities

Activity one

Watch the video <u>Interviewing a Special Person</u>
Pause and discuss the video as needed.

Discussion questions

- Why do we interview people?
- Who would you like to interview? Why?
- Brainstorm questions you would like to ask a special person and write them down as a class. What would you like to know about their life in the past?

Here are some ideas:

- What is your name?
- When were you born?
- Where were you born?
- What were things like when they were your age?
- What games did you play when you were my age?
- What do you do? Do you have a job or an activity that you like to do?
- What was your favourite food when you were my age?
- What was school like when you were my age?
- What technology did you use when you were my age? OR Did you have mobile phones and other screens when you were my age?
- · How did you communicate with people who lived far away from you?
- What do you think is the best invention from your lifetime?
- What surprises you about kids' lives today?
- How would you tell people about the special person? Would you make a poster, draw a picture, present it to other people?





Activity two

- Think about a special person you want to interview. Try find someone older than
 you, like a parent or grandparent.
- Choose which questions to ask your special person. Ask your special person five questions. You can use the questions we came up with as a class, or make your own.
