Activity one

Watch the video [Reading the Neighbourhood: houses, street signs and shops](#)

Pause and discuss the video as needed.

Discussion questions

- Why do you think we name streets after important people, places or objects?
- What or who would you name a street after? Why?
- What are the differences between big, old houses like Rippon Lea and Labassa, and newer houses?
- How can you tell a shop building is new or old? Are all parts of it old? What new parts might have been added to the building?

Activity two

Take a walk in your neighbourhood using the following worksheet on clipboards. Or, have a look at your local area on Google Maps Street View.

Make sure you are with a teacher or trusted adult.

Always walk on the footpaths and never cross the road by yourself.

Return to school and discuss findings.

Street names:

Name three streets you saw on your walk.

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What is the name of the street your school is on?

Why do you think these names are important?

Houses:

What types of houses can you see in your neighbourhood (apartments, townhouses, mansion, etc.)? Are they old or new? How can you tell?

Shops:

What shops are near you? Are they in old or new buildings? How can you tell?
