5. WRITTEN PUBLIC QUESTIONS TO COUNCIL

Six written public questions to Council have been received to be read and responded to.

Question 1

There are pigeon faeces that haven't been cleaned off the Glen Huntly high st footpath for many years. Surely the bare minimum is regularly cleaning the footpaths. I know this isn't the first time this has been requested. Please provide when this will be addressed and what the long term solution is.

Answer:

In relation to the concerns about pigeons.

Glen Huntly Road was pressure washed on 28 February to remove the pigeon faeces, with a positive outcome. In addition, the area receives three pressure washes per year, and twice weekly care crew attendance. Glen Huntly Activity Centre is a priority one location, and therefore this schedule was developed to ensure the Centre receives the highest attendance.

Keeping Glen Huntly Activity Centre clean of pigeon faeces, will be an

ongoing matter and Council's Works Depot team will continue to monitor the location as part of the Activity Centre Care Crew Team's proactive programs.

In January and February this year 'Do not feed the pigeons' signs were installed along Glen Huntly Road to increase awareness of the cause of the issue.

It is possible to schedule an additional clean if the need arises outside of the established maintenance schedule. Please contact us directly to arrange this.

Question 3

Caulfield East

How many excessive noise complaints during prohibited hours has council received in past 5 years?

Answer:

Between 1 January 2020 and 17 March 2025 Council's Public Health Unit received 166 noise complaints that included noise emissions from residential equipment such as heating and cooling equipment and swimming pool pumps that were reported to be operating during times prohibited by the *Environment Protection Regulations 2021*. Approximately 55 of these complaints were specific to nighttime noise only.

Of these, how many have been found in favour of the complainants using EPA guidelines in prohibited hours in past 5 years?

Answer:

None. During the period 1 January 2020 to 17 March 2025 Council attended 3 after-hours noise assessments. On these occasions the noise was not found to be unreasonable because the noise was not audible

By way of context, in the first instance Council takes an educative approach to noise matters where residential equipment is reported to be operating during the prohibited times by informing the resident about the *Environment Protection* noise laws. In most of these cases, the noise matter can be resolved at this stage.

Council will investigate further when continued breaches occur following the education provided. In these cases the complainant is requested to provide more detailed information to assist Council's investigation. Without this, Council has limited information about the matter when making a determination of unreasonable noise.

In many of the reported noise complaints where Council had commenced this investigation, the complainant decided not to pursue the matter, and Council closed its investigation or Council determined that the noise was not unreasonable noise according to the EP Act.

To determine whether a breach of the *Environment Protection* Regulations 2021 has occurred, Council officers will investigate ongoing after-hours noise complaints in accordance with Councils After-hours Noise Complaints Policy. These assessments are part of a planned inspection or call out arrangement when there is a reoccurrence of the issue and Council's prior interaction with the resident has failed.

Question 5

How many excessive noise complaints during non-prohibited hours has council received in past 5 years?

Answer:

Between 1 January 2020 and 17 March 2025 Council's Public Health Unit received 321 noise complaints relating to noise occurring during times that are not considered prohibited hours by the *Environment Protection Regulations 2021*.

Question 6

Of these, how many have been found in favour of the complainants using EPA guidelines in non-prohibited hours in past 5 years?

Answer:

In the period 1 January 2020 to 17 March 2025 Council

issued two Improvement Notices for nuisance noise. Council has not issued a notice in relation to unreasonable noise.

By way of context, the relevant legislation that Council investigates noise matters includes the *Public Health and Wellbeing Act 2008* (PHW Act) and the *Environment Protection Act 2017* (EP Act). The nature of the complaint will inform Council's investigation and actions.

In relation to the PHW Act, noise is deemed a nuisance if it is or is liable to be dangerous to health or offensive, meaning noxious or injurious to

personal comfort. Concerning the EP Act, when considering whether noise is unreasonable, Council must have regard to its volume, intensity, duration, character, time, place, how often it is emitted, and other circumstances.

As part of the investigation, Council will request the complainant to provide further information about when and how long the noise continues, how often the noise occurs, and how the noise is affecting a person's health to assist Council's investigation. Council officers will also conduct a site assessment, and in some situations, noise readings to clarify the noise.

In most of the reported noise complaints where Council has commenced this investigation, the complainant has decided not to pursue the matter, and Council closed its investigation, or Council determined that there was no nuisance noise and/or no unreasonable noise according to the relevant legislation.

In the case where a nuisance or unreasonable noise is found to exist, Council will in the first instance seek compliance from the offender before undertaking enforcement.

10.2 AUSTRALIAN LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION (ALGA) 2025 NATIONAL ASSEMBLY MOTION

That Council endorses the following two motions for submission to the 2025 Australian Local Government Association National General Assembly:

Motion one: Strengthening community services to enhance wellbeing, safety, and violence prevention

That the National General Assembly calls on the Australian Government to strengthen and invest in community services by:

- Fostering community safety and social cohesion through dedicated funding streams and resources for local councils to implement evidencebased community safety initiatives that promote social cohesion and inclusivity. These initiatives may include infrastructure improvements (e.g. improved lighting, clear and effective signage, graffiti removal, safer pedestrian routes), delivery of events, community engagement programs, and anti-discrimination measures.
- 2. Enhancing the prevention of family violence through sustained and long-term investment in primary prevention initiatives, tailored funding for support services and resources, including long-term housing, ongoing counselling, employment services, and legal and financial support.
- 3. Improving community wellbeing through:
 - a) ensuring more inclusive and accessible public spaces
 - b) expanding funding for mental health support services and social cohesion programs
 - c) partnering with councils to deliver sustainable, local programs that address the impacts of rising living costs and support climate action, with a particular focus on supporting the most vulnerable in our communities, and
 - d) delivering increased funding to support homelessness services and prevention initiatives, ensuring individuals receive

assistance before reaching crisis levels.

Motion two: Increased federal funding and support for urban flood mitigation and resilience

That the National General Assembly calls on the Australian Government to:

- 1. Develop a National Urban Flood resilience strategy to coordinate federal, state and local governments and ensure a consistent, long-term approach to infrastructure renewal, especially in urban areas experiencing high growth.
- 2. Significantly increase funding to the Disaster Ready Fund to meet the growing demand from local governments for flood mitigation and resilience projects, acknowledging the significant oversubscription of the current program.
- Establish a dedicated funding stream within the Disaster Ready Fund specifically for stormwater infrastructure upgrades and flood mitigation works in urban municipalities, ensuring equitable access to resilience funding beyond rural communities.
- 4. Promote nature-based solutions to improve water permeability in urban environments by investing in green infrastructure, permeable surfaces, and sustainable drainage systems to counteract the increased flood risk associated with increasing urban density and reduced natural infiltration.
- 5. Expand opportunities to improve the capacity and capability of local government to respond to the increasing frequency and intensity of extreme weather events due to climate change.
