NATIONAL SORRY DAY 26 MAY

National Sorry Day provides the opportunity to reflect on the sad and painful experiences of the Stolen Generations and recognise the healing and power of saying sorry.

MABO DAY **3 JUNE**

Mabo Day marks the anniversary of the High Court of Australia's judgement in 1992 which led to the passing of the Native Title Act 1993. The day is named after Eddie Koiki Mabo a Torres Strait Islander man who led a campaign for Indigenous land rights. He argued that Australia was not terra nullius (land that does not belong to anyone) at the time of European settlement as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples had lived on the land and had a unique relationship with it for thousands of years. He argued that white settlers had no right to take the land without agreement or payment.

THE ANNIVERSARY OF THE NATIONAL APOLOGY **13 FEBRUARY**

The National Apology first held in 2008 says sorry for the past mistreatments to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples particularly relating to the Stolen Generations. www.australia.gov.au Search apology to Australia's indigenous peoples.

MALLANBOOL RESERVE INTERPRETIVE WALK

BOORAN RESERVE CULTURAL STORYBOARDS

Booran Reserve is a destination park located on the corner of Booran and Glenhuntly Roads, Glen Huntly. The entrance is marked by Aboriginal interpretive cultural storyboards that welcome visitors.

The Reserve has something for everyone — from water play spaces, to a range of stimulating play experiences and environments for all ages and abilities, complemented by picnic areas, open lawn and shaded seating areas.





Mallanbool Reserve is a cultural and botanical park located on the corner of Leila and Murrumbeena Roads, Murrumbeena. Walkers can go on a journey to learn about the Aboriginal Kulin community who were the original inhabitants of the land. The cultural trail outlines the Kulin way of life of harvesting plants, fishing and hunting. The botanical element of the trail outlines the native plant life that was abundant prior to European settlement. A series of descriptive signs includes:

- Kulin the people of the land;
- the arrival of ngamudji, the white settlers;
- women's business:
- land management; and
- the effects of european settlement.
